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## Introduction

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The Jersey Community Foundation was established in 2020, with a £2 million donation from Dormant Bank Accounts, to get much needed grant funding to local charities during the Covid-19 pandemic. The Foundation has been at the forefront of the philanthropic response to Covid-19, providing funding to help the voluntary sector respond to the Island's immediate needs, to adapt and to survive.

During 2021, the Foundation was also responsible for the distribution of 50% of the Channel Islands Lottery proceeds from the 2019 CI Lottery, totalling almost £700,000. These funds were restricted to projects within sports and active lifestyles, arts, culture & heritage and science sectors.

2021 was the Foundation's first full year of operating, and we distributed over £1 million to 46 local organisations. We are delighted to share our 2021 Annual Review with you and highlight some of the fantastic projects we have funded.

## Introduction (Continued)

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### Looking forward to 2022

Nobody knows for certain what the future will hold for charitable organisations in the Island in 2022 and beyond. Many are still unable to raise funds through events and are having to continuously adapt to find new ways of delivering services.

The Jersey Community Foundation will continue to support the charitable sector with grants from our existing Coronavirus Response Fund, of which there is approximately £670,000 remaining and from the lottery fund, of which there is over £775,000 available for distribution in 2022. In addition, the Foundation will be distributing a number of donor funds, and will also be running a pilot project to manage the distribution of two funds that have previously been managed by the Treasury Department, the Greville Bathe Fund and the Ann Alice Rayner Fund, which distribute between £800,000 and £1 million in grants per annum.

In total, we expect our charitable giving in 2022 to be over **£2 million.**

A key objective will be to continue securing further funding to support the activities of the Foundation. To do that we will continue to reach out to potential donors, to other funding organisations and to government and we will continue to provide a grant-making platform to individual donors, charitable trusts and local businesses who want to support local community and voluntary groups.

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## Did you know...?

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### Community Foundations

Community Foundations have been in existence for over a century, the first one being established in Ohio 1914 and are considered to be one of the fastest growing philanthropic movements globally.

Over time community foundations develop an expert understanding of the issues in an area and how best to deliver funding to tackle them.

They do this by:

- Encouraging local philanthropy
- Researching and understanding local need
- Strengthening the local voluntary and community sector
- Convening community resources

Community foundations offer a variety of grant-making programmes funded by donations from individuals, families, businesses as well as grants from local authorities and the government.

### UK Community Foundations

The Foundation is an overseas member of the UK Community Foundation network of 47 Community Foundations, who are committed to improving the lives of local people and communities, particularly the most vulnerable, isolated and disadvantaged, by matching those who want to help, with those who need the help.

UK Community Foundations (UKCF) run an accreditation programme and JCF will be assessed in the next round. The assessment evaluates the ongoing practices and development trajectory of each community foundation within core standards of governance, finance, philanthropy, grant making, community participation & organisational development. The programme is unique to UKCF, providing the only accreditation process internationally that is tailored to and designed by community foundations.

### Coronavirus Response Fund

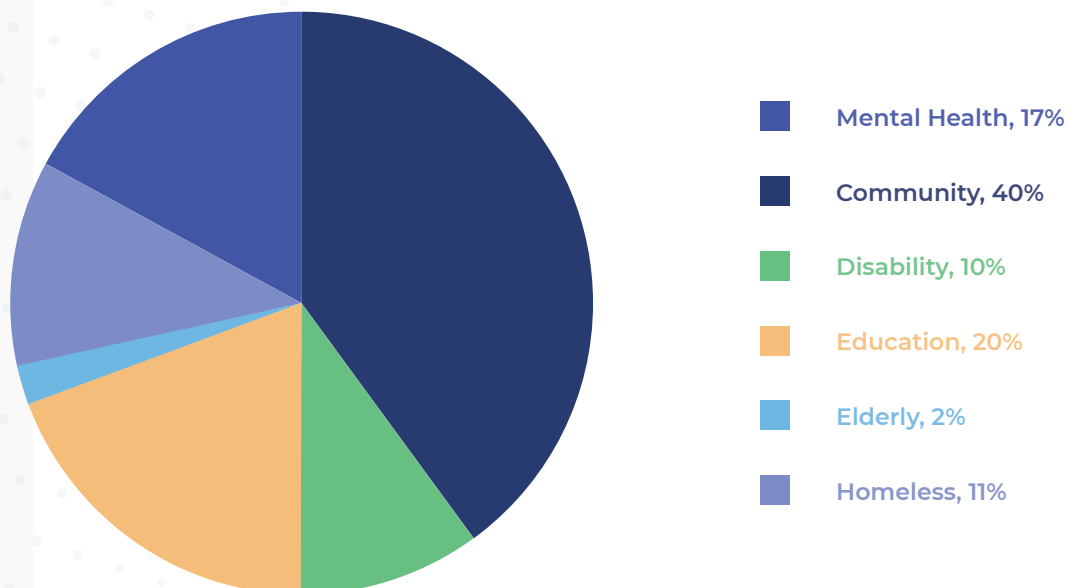
Total Awarded 2021 - £716,540

## Coronavirus Response Fund Case Study #1

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### Jersey Action Against Rape (JAAR)

**Amount:** £30,000

**Project:** Extending 1-2-1 Counselling Service to survivors of sexual assault to meet increased demand from Covid-19.

Throughout the Covid-19 pandemic the charity saw an increase in the number of sexual assault and violence survivors contacting them and asking for help to process their trauma. This funding helped JAAR to continue to provide a dedicated counselling framework to the victims of rape and sexual assault and their families, ultimately reducing the waiting time for services.



Zoe Collins-Fisher,  
Community Engagement Officer from JAAR commented:

“ During the first ‘stay at home’ order in March of 2020, JAAR started to receive an increase in people reaching out, asking for our help to support them on their healing journey.

Towards the end of 2020, we were in the unfortunate position of having to tell clients that there was 9-10 months waiting time for our services. However, with the help and support from the JCF and other donors, we have now been able to increase the number of counselling hours and have worked hard to reduce this waiting time to 12-14 weeks.

Since JAAR opened in 2015, we have provided over 2,800 hours of free counselling to survivors and their families in Jersey.





## Coronavirus Response Fund Case Study #2

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### **British Red Cross**

**Amount:** £50,000

**Project:** Jersey Community Connector

Tackling loneliness and social isolation is a priority for the British Red Cross and Covid-19 has exacerbated the challenges of social isolation and loneliness for many. This project targeted those who might be considered lonely and/ or isolated by taking a person-centred approach, to support them develop their own plan identifying specific goals they hoped to achieve, over a 12-week period. The aim was to ensure people in Jersey who feel isolated or lonely had the support they needed.

### **Results**

The service went live on 2 August 21 with funding from JCF. During this time a service co-ordinator and 5 volunteers were recruited with a plan to recruit further volunteers.

The service co-ordinator and team of volunteers have provided support to Jersey residents who have experienced periods of loneliness and isolation. The service works in partnership with other local groups and organisations to provide person centred support and reconnects these residents to their communities.

*With funding received from JCF the British Red Cross has been able to reach those that are most vulnerable in Jersey. We have recognised the uniqueness of the Island and adapted our Community Connectors service model providing much needed support to Islanders that have experienced isolation and loneliness as a result of the pandemic.*

*The funding has given us the opportunity to work in partnership with other organisations and implement a local model of support that is person centred and fits the needs of Jersey.*

*We are grateful for the support given by the JCF throughout the implementation and delivery of our Community Connectors service.*



## Fund #2. Lottery Funds

### Lottery Funds

In December 2020, the Government of Jersey changed how the CI Lottery proceeds were to be distributed, and for the first time, allocated 50% of the proceeds to be awarded to projects within sports and active lifestyles, heritage, culture, arts and science sectors. This change enabled a far wider range of organisations to apply for funding and JCF were delighted to be chosen as the distributor for this new allocation.

These funds were received in June 2021 and at the end of 2021, the Foundation had awarded over £530,000 to 29 organisations. In July 2021, a proposition was passed in the States to award JCF a further 50% (£761,968) of lottery funding from the 2020 proceeds.

### Arts, Culture & Heritage Fund

**Total Awarded 2021 - £158,904**

Arts, culture & heritage are important and valued in Jersey and are key to our sense of identity as an Island. Boosting opportunities for the community, improving skills and creativity and continuing to develop community cohesion are key priorities for this fund.

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# Jèrriais

### Le Don Balleine Incorporated Association (LDBIA)

**Amount** - £18,000

**Project** - Promote Jersey's Native Language by adding Jèrriais to the Linguascope Language Learning Website and App

The project will enable all new and existing learners to access interactive online activities to consolidate and expand their learning of Jèrriais.



### Results

Jèrriais is now live on an online language learning platform which is used by hundreds of thousands of schools worldwide.

Former Victoria College student, Atticus Mawby, who is currently studying languages at Durham University, provided the voice for the Jèrriais section on Linguascope. The Jèrriais Teaching Service offers free annual subscriptions to all Jersey schools, so students and staff can access all the languages available on the website and app.

**Head of the Jèrriais Teaching Service, Ben Spink, said:**

“ We are thrilled to have high-quality, engaging, interactive digital Jèrriais resources for younger learners and we are excited to let schools know that this opportunity is available. ”

## Arts, Culture & Heritage Fund Case Study #2

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### **ArtHouse Jersey**

**Amount** - £40,000

**Project** - Big Ideas Immersive Exhibition

This funding contributed to the creation of Skipton Big Ideas, a highly ambitious immersive exhibition of a quality and scale never before seen in the Island. It was designed to be a platform that concurrently: i/ engaged thousands of people with creativity who might not normally see themselves as 'art enthusiasts'; ii/ offered interactive activities with targeted members of the community whilst also sharing their perspective of the world with a wider audience; iii/ provided paid work and development opportunities for hundreds of creatives, thereby supporting the creative ecology of the Island; iv/ raised the standards and expectations of what can be offered through the arts in Jersey.

### **Results**

Skipton Big Ideas was ArtHouse Jersey's major flagship project for 2021. It was a spectacular, immersive exhibition featuring over 20 art installations by local and international artists at St Helier Town Church. Designed to welcome the whole Island community, the exhibition was an event that Jersey can be proud of.

It completely transformed the church building with installations, artworks and creative lighting and was free of charge for anyone to attend.

Head of Communication, Carrie Cooper said:

*"Skipton Big Ideas was a huge success. We're incredibly proud that having engaged 8,000 people it was one the most popular art exhibitions ever to have been held in Jersey. Our gratitude goes to the JCF for their support, which enabled the delivery of such an impactful project. We set out to create something that enabled the Island to engage with three big ideas facing our community, and although it was certainly challenging, our team thrived under the pressure and felt a great deal of satisfaction at having put together an exhibition that resonated so positively with the local community. We hope that Skipton Big Ideas inspires further projects that can also leave their mark on the Island's cultural landscape."*

**Total Awarded 2021 - £247,667**

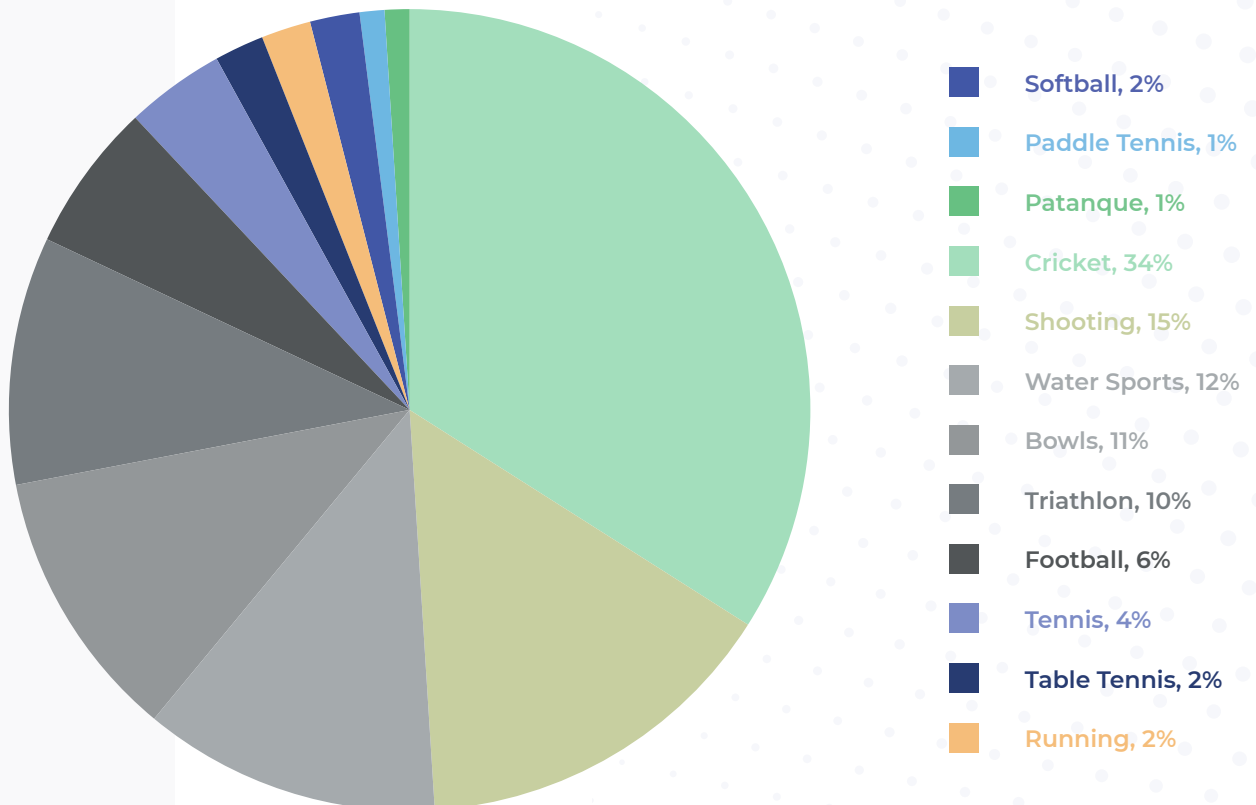

## Sport and Active Lifestyles Case Study #1

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### Jersey parkrun

**Amount** - £4,200

**Project** - 2021 Jersey parkrun. Utilise technology to support the post Covid contactless operating model.

The focus of the funding was to utilize technology to support the post Covid contactless operating model. The team behind Jersey parkrun purchased two dedicated iPads to process the results and trigger the email and text result system ensuring all runners got their times securely and quickly. Parkrun also provided a more robust and permanent storage system and a PA system capable of delivering clear audio at briefings and important event message points each week and created event signage to assist 'parkrunners' with information. Finally, they provided simple shelters for volunteers who are key to the event but exposed to all elements.

### Results

Established in Jersey in 2015, Parkrun have delivered over 250 races to date. This funding allowed Parkrun Jersey to modernise their systems and to adapt to new processes that needed to be implemented as a result of Covid-19 to ensure they were operating safely and securely.

*“ We have an amazing team of volunteers who give their time to help Jersey keep fit and active throughout the year – even Christmas and New Year’s Day. The funds awarded by JCF are invaluable to us as parkrun prides itself on being a free and completely inclusive event, so we have limited funds to be able to buy or replace our equipment. ”*

## Sport and Active Lifestyles Case Study #2

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### Jersey Table Tennis Association

**Amount** - £4,725

**Project** - Providing After School Table Tennis Coaching

This project provided table tennis coaching, 5 days a week in term time with each session lasting 90 minutes and led by a fully trained and experienced coach. Sessions were available for both beginners and improvers. The main aim of the project was to encourage 100 children to play table tennis and be more active physically and mentally whilst also having the opportunity to enjoy each others company.

### Results

The after school training sessions were successfully implemented.

## Applied Science & Research Case Study #1



### Jersey International Centre of Advanced Studies

**Amount** - £20,000

**Project** - Study of Blue Carbon Processes

Islands and island communities have a major role to play in the processes of quantifying blue carbon. The primary aim of this project is to better understand how the processes of blue carbon can maximise the potential ecological, environmental and social value of the sea surrounding Jersey in contrast to current uses.

### Results

This funding is for one year of a three-year project and results will be reported as the surveys progress and the data is collected. A study of this type will be extremely beneficial to Jersey within a social, economic and environmental context and will help develop a blue carbon action plan, addressing specific island circumstances, opportunities and capacities.







## Fund #3. Environment Fund

Grants from our Environment Fund are made to organisations supporting environmental conservation and restoration projects in Jersey which: support Jersey’s decarbonization plans; enhance and restore local biodiversity; address climate change; support Jersey’s carbon neutral strategy; or generally further environmental protection and enhancement locally.

## Environment Fund Case Study #1



### Jersey Marine Conservation

**Amount:** £ 46,845.00 (three-year grant)

£10,775 awarded from Environment fund, remaining commitment from Applied Science and Applied Research Lottery Fund.

**Project** - Seagrass Restoration

Seagrass can store huge amounts of Carbon and reduce the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. Jersey’s biggest meadow in St Catherine’s harbour is therefore of massive importance. These beds have been drastically reduced by moorings and craft movement.

The Jersey Marine Conservation (JMC) project will accurately survey the existing area, look at ways to restore growth and monitor regrowth following the installation of environmentally friendly mooring buoys and the decommissioning of unused mooring systems by Ports of Jersey.

## Environment Fund (Continued)

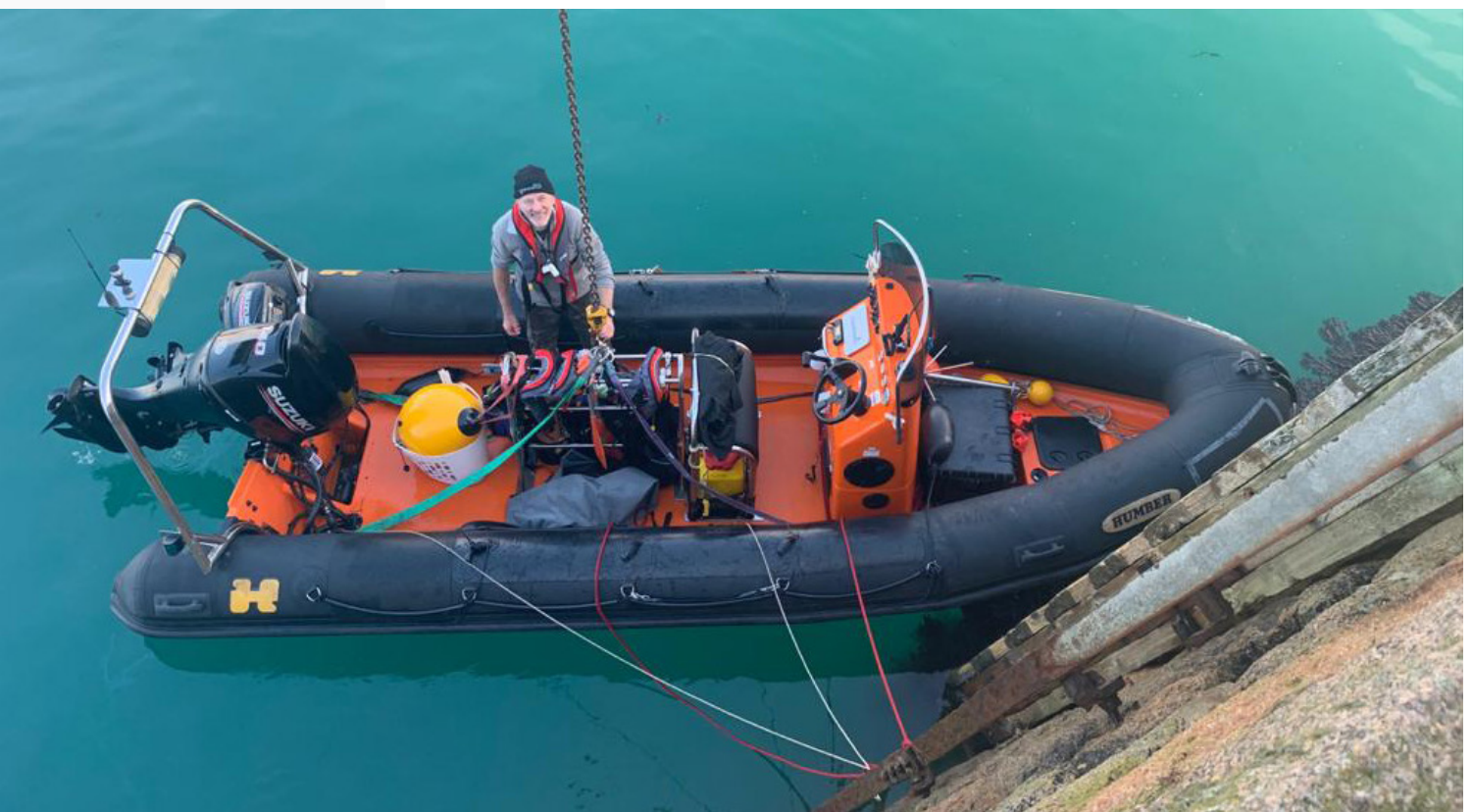
### Results

As a multi-year grant, results will be reported, as the surveys progress and the data is analysed. The study will assess biodiversity and through the measurement of seagrass density, evaluate the effectiveness of a mooring system that currently does not exist anywhere in the world, that works in areas subject to extreme tidal flows. This potentially will not only provide a solution for Jersey but could help the regrowth of seagrass beds that are massively in decline in many parts of the world.

Emily Dow, Science and Education Officer for Jersey Marine Conservation said:

*"We are so happy and extremely grateful to the Jersey Community Foundation and its partners for making this project possible. Our seagrass meadows are an incredible habitat which supports a variety of marine life, including the endangered seahorses, crustaceans and juvenile fish. As sea levels rise and our coast suffers erratic weather patterns, the meadows that could potentially extend along most of our east coast will help reduce coastal erosion and provide substantial carbon capturing potential. This has a huge economic benefit, enabling Island funds to be devoted to other community needs.*

*We expect to see a substantial regrowth of the seagrass and an increase of biodiversity in these areas that have been degraded by unregulated boat traffic and destructive mooring systems. We are really excited to be part of a proactive cooperative project that safeguards and enhances our Island's Blue Carbon resource".*

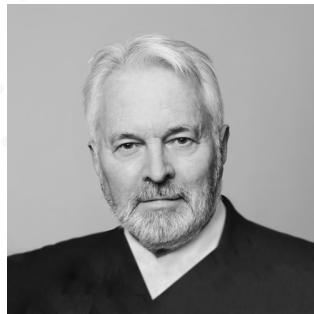
